Most irritating and hurtful of all was Peshie's sister-in-law Simi, the wife of her oldest brother. Simi had pegged Peshie as a spoiled brat long ago, when she first married into the family and Peshie was just a high-school girl.

Avi, Peshie's husband, urged her to see the situation for what it really was. Simi and her husband struggled financially, and Simi couldn't bear seeing her little sister-in-law married, thriving and *baruch Hashem* able to afford a few extras to make family life a bit easier. Every cutting comment Simi made – all with a nonchalant air that made Peshie wonder if she had really heard right – came from that pool of envy.

One day, Simi called Peshie to ask for a \$700 loan with which to buy a new *sheitel* for her son's bar mitzvah. Peshie didn't want to do it. Why should she lend a hefty sum of money to someone who was consistently cruel toward her, and moreover, would probably not be able to repay the loan?

But Avi saw the situation differently. "We go out of our comfort zone for family," he said. "You don't have to lend the money, but you would be doing something great if you did."

Peshie decided to be great.

At the bar mitzvah, Simi soaked up compliments on her new look. But when Peshie complimented her, she accepted it with a backhanded insult about how her \$700 *sheitel* was nice, but it wasn't as glamorous as Peshie's namebrand piece. For the first time ever, instead of shrinking in the heat of Simi's comment, Peshie stood tall. What was this strange feeling? It was strength. It was courage. It was true grit! And with it, Simi's

A man named Stuart Hughes was commissioned to build a yacht for an anonymous Malaysian billionaire. He was given free rein to make it the most opulent yacht in the world. The result, the History Supreme, sold for \$4.8 billion in 2011, a price that has yet to be topped. Its astronomical price tag was the result of the pounds of platinum and gold with which it was crafted, as well as the 500-carat-diamond-encrusted iPhone with which it was equipped.

Let's imagine for a moment what tools might have been used to build this vessel. What equipment might have been used to shape the precious metals and to ensure that the boat was not only opulent, but well engineered? What if someone told you that the entire project was carried out with a rusty hammer, a handsaw and some glue?

You'd know that couldn't be true. A fine product cannot be created with crude tools. And what could be finer, what could be more precious, than our words of prayer and Torah? No amount of platinum and gold can come close to the value of a few words of Gemara uttered by a sincere Jew sitting in a *beis medrash* with his learning partner.

The tool that creates this exquisite product is our mouth. A Jew's mouth is designed for the job of transmitting Hashem's holiness to the world. But the Chofetz Chaim

warns us that loshon hora ruins the tool. When we make our mouth blunt and crude with gossip, we find that it can no longer produce pure words of Torah. We might be learning for hours a day, but our efforts won't produce the results we are seeking.

The good news is that this tool can be repaired. The day we banish loshon hora from our lives, we begin acquiring the merit and seeing the blessing that our Torah and *tefillah* can bring.
