"Well, apparently, she isn't what she seems. I think there are anger issues," Esther says. "I heard that she only has the kids every other week. That says a lot."

"That's so strange," Malka observes. "We used to go to a *shiur* together and she was so sweet! Amazing how people can fake it."

For months, Malka sees Mrs. Goldberg around town and thinks, "What's with her?" When Mrs. Goldberg calls to see if Malka's daughter would like to join her daughter for a swim in the Goldbergs' pool, Malka makes an excuse, thinking, "Can I trust her to watch them?"

One day Mrs. Goldberg meets Malka in the supermarket and strikes up a conversation. It seems so normal. "Maybe there's more to the picture than I know," Malka wonders. She begins to feel a bit evil, harboring negative thoughts about her neighbor. "I wish Esther hadn't told me anything," she thinks. Can Malka undo the damage?

WHAT'S REALLY REAL?

"Don't tell me you were joking. I know an insult when I hear one," said a man to his cousin.

"Don't tell me what I meant!" he replied. "No one would take what I said as an insult. You just want to feel bad for yourself."

Which is the truth? The man has his reality and the cousin has his. Can both be the truth? Rav Shimon Schwab taught that the only accurate definition of truth - emes - is "Hashem's reality." That is the truth that encompasses everything all facts, all feelings, all intentions, all consequences.

Everything else is someone's interpretation of the reality he is experiencing. The man in the story suffers from low self-esteem. Therefore, he interprets neutral comments to be insults. The cousin suffers from arrogance. Therefore, he states things in an abrasive way. Only Hashem knows where the balance lies.

Knowing that reality exists in Hashem's realm alone opens our hearts to forgiving others. We realize that what we think is the truth is only our

perception of the truth. Furthermore, the other person has his perception of the truth. We are all trying to live according to the truth, and the more we define our life by the Torah, the more we tap into Hashem's truth. Aside from Him, no one has a monopoly on reality. We can find it within ourselves to forgive another person for seeing the world through the one pair of eyes he's been given.
