BUILDING A RELATIONSHIP WITH OUR CREATOR



Dear Friends.

With the high holiday season upon us we wonder what the underlying message is. Even if we know what to do on Rosh Hashana, Yom Kippur and Sukkot, to listen to the shofar, to repent and to sit in a sukkah and shake the four species, are we simply performing random, disconnected acts? Or is there something deeper going on? We don't want to miss the forest for the trees! I would like to suggest that the message is clear, it is one of LOVE. This period is one in which we develop a love relationship with our Father in heaven. The month in which we currently reside, the Jewish month of Elul, is an acronym for the verse, "I am to my Beloved and my Beloved is to me". The "Beloved" the verse is referring to is G-d. He is saying, "I want to get close to you, my people, and extend to you my loving embrace. Just come close to me and I will reciprocate by coming close to you!"

On Rosh Hashana, as we listen to the Shofar blast, we draw together with our fellow Jews as one. The shofar blast is called a "teruah", which comes from the root "re'ah", meaning beloved friend. We come together with our beloved friends, our fellow Jews, to coronate the King. He responds by lovingly inviting us into His palace for the coming ten days. These are the "ten days of teshuva", or repentance. We deeply feel our closeness to the Al-mighty during that time and refer to Him as "the holy King" in our prayers. This loving embrace inspires us to desire to become even closer - with our loving return to Him through teshuva. When we do our part to get closer, G-d brings us into His inner sanctum on the day of Yom Kippur. In that holy space we become like angels of G-d, not needing to eat or indulge in earthly pleasures. We bask in the glory of His Presence which envelops us on this awesome and joyous day. If we have gotten to this point, G-d invites us to be "put up in His hotel" as we enter the Sukkah. In this simple hut, devoid of creature pleasures, we joyously and lovingly bask in the warmth of the Shechinah, the Divine Presence which is palpable in that abode.

This is the warmth and joy which accompanies us throughout the rest of the year. May we join hands and hearts with our fellow Jews to make the most of this special time and allow us to build upon it for an amazing New Year. Rebbetzin Marcy and I join in warmest wishes for a very healthy, joyous and productive year of growth, nachas and success in all your endeavors. And may we continue to build DATA into the premier Jewish educational center for the Dallas Jewish community to the benefit and glory of all.

CUSTOMS Y'ALL

ROSH HASHANA

The first night of Rosh Hashanah, we greet each other:

To a man: L'Shana Tova Techasaiv Vessaichasaim L'Alter, L'chaim Tovim U'Lshalom.

To a woman: L'Shana Tova Techasaivi Ve Saichasaimi L'Alter, L'chaim Tovim U'Lshalom.

(For a good year, may you be inscribed and sealed immediately for a good life and for peace.)

The Talmud tells us Simana Milsah, that what we do at the beginning of the year is an omen for what the year will bring. We therefore have the custom of eating an apple dipped in honey along with many other foods as a sign for a good year. (See Artscroll Rosh Hashanah Machzor, page 96-98)

A traditional custom is to wear a Kittel on both Rosh Hashanah mornings and all day Yom Kippur (including Kol Nidre.)

YOM KIPPUR

PROHIBITIONS

In addition to the Melachos (creative activity which is forbidden on Shabbos) Yom Kippur has an additional five prohibitions:

- 1. Eating and drinking
- 2. Wearing leather shoes
- 3. Anointing with oils
- 4. Washing (Morning and when necessary: one may wash up to knuckles. If one has become dirty, one may wash off dirt.)
- 5. Marital relations

CUSTOMS

- It is a mitzvah to eat the day before Yom Kippur.
- Kapparos a chicken or money are used to say these words asking for forgiveness, Machzor page 2.
- After the Seudas Hamafsekes (the meal before the fast), there is a custom to bless one's children. This blessing can be found in the ArtScroll Yom Kippur Machzor on page 32.
- Ner Nishma- There is a custom to light a candle which will burn for all of Yom Kippur (one per couple). This is in addition to lighting a Yarzheit candle.
- Tefilas Zakkah- Before Kol Nidre, many have the custom of saying this highly emotional prayer asking for forgiveness and forgiving those who have wronged you.
- Married, divorced or widowed men are encouraged to wear a Kittel for services on Yom Kippur
