WhoCan Help?

It is permitted to give a negative opinion if it will be a to'eles for next year's Yamim Nora'im. But loshon hora l'to'eles can only be spoken to the person who can actually fix the issue. It is unlikely that the whole office team needs to hear your opinion of the chazzan.
